How can you carry another's burden, yet be responsible for your own load?

What does this imply about life in the church?

Ephesians 3:6

How does this seem to be an impossible community?

What such dissimilar groups does God still put together today?

Galatians 3:26-28

What are some "opposite" pairs that Paul mentions?

What are some "opposites" that are represented in our congregation?

Why is this a strength, not a weakness?

What implications does this have for outreach?
