How Essential is Christ's Resurrection?

Bible Class for Easter, 4-12-20

As we celebrate Easter, it is good to look into the facts of the resurrection of Jesus. The Bible is clear in saying this is the bedrock of our faith and hope. Although we cannot meet together for Bible Study, the following outline, based on 1 Corinthians 15, may help you see the truth of the resurrection and why it matters.

1. The Heart of the Gospel: Christ's Death and Resurrection!

Read 1 Corinthians 15:1-11: Now I would remind you, brothers, of the gospel I preached to you, which you received, in which you stand, 2 and by which you are being saved, if you hold fast to the word I preached to you—unless you believed in vain. 3 For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, 4 that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, 5 and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. 6 Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have fallen asleep. 7 Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. 8 Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. 9 For I am the least of the apostles, unworthy to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. 10 But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me was not in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them, though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. 11 Whether then it was I or they, so we preach and so you believed.

What are the most basic elements of "the Gospel?" List them from verses 3-7:

How many witnesses to the resurrected Christ does Paul name?

What does this say about the importance of the resurrection?

Was the resurrection spiritual or physical; does it matter?

2. The Truth about Doubts

Read 1 Corinthians 15:12-34: ¹²Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead? ¹³But if there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. ¹⁴And if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain. ¹⁵We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified about God that he raised Christ, whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. ¹⁶For if the dead are not raised, not even Christ has been raised. ¹⁷And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. ¹⁸Then those also who have fallen asleep in

Christ have perished. 19 If in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied. 20 But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. ²¹ For as by a man came death, by a man has come also the resurrection of the dead. ²²For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive. 23 But each in his own order: Christ the firstfruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. 24 Then comes the end, when he delivers the kingdom to God the Father after destroying every rule and every authority and power. 25 For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. 26 The last enemy to be destroyed is death. 27 For "God has put all things in subjection under his feet." But when it says, "all things are put in subjection," it is plain that he is excepted who put all things in subjection under him. 28 When all things are subjected to him, then the Son himself will also be subjected to him who put all things in subjection under him, that God may be all in all. 29 Otherwise, what do people mean by being baptized on behalf of the dead? If the dead are not raised at all, why are people baptized on their behalf? 30 Why are we in danger every hour? ³¹ I protest, brothers, by my pride in you, which I have in Christ Jesus our Lord, I die every day! 32 What do I gain if, humanly speaking, I fought with beasts at Ephesus? If the dead are not raised, "Let us eat and drink, for tomorrow we die." 33 Do not be deceived: "Bad company ruins good morals." 34 Wake up from your drunken stupor, as is right, and do not go on sinning. For some have no knowledge of God. I say this to your shame.

What might be considered the "Achilles Heel" of the Christian faith?

If Christ did not rise physically from death, the Christian faith is useless.

What if there were no resurrection (29-34)?

There is no salvation.

Paul and every other witness of the resurrection is a liar.

A Christian's faith is in vain and the guilt of sin remains.

The death brought by sin is still unconquered. Baptism is worthless.

The struggles of Christians are a waste of time and effort.

Knowing this, what is the comfort of so many witnesses to Christ's resurrection?

What should be the central message of a Christian funeral service?

How does Baptism connect us personally to Christ's death and rising?

Read Romans 6:3-5: ³ Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? ⁴ We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life. ⁵ For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his.

3. Questions about the Resurrected Body

Read 1 Corinthians 15:35-49: 35 But someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" ³⁶ You foolish person! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. 37 And what you sow is not the body that is to be, but a bare kernel, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. 38 But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body. 39 For not all flesh is the same, but there is one kind for humans, another for animals, another for birds, and another for fish. 40 There are heavenly bodies and earthly bodies, but the glory of the heavenly is of one kind, and the glory of the earthly is of another. 41 There is one glory of the sun, and another glory of the moon, and another glory of the stars; for star differs from star in glory. ⁴² So is it with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable; what is raised is imperishable. 43 It is sown in dishonor; it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness; it is raised in power. 44 It is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a natural body, there is also a spiritual body. 45 Thus it is written, "The first man Adam became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. 46 But it is not the spiritual that is first but the natural, and then the spiritual. 47 The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. 48 As was the man of dust, so also are those who are of the dust, and as is the man of heaven, so also are those who are of heaven. 49 Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we shall also bear the image of the man of heaven.

Who is "the first Adam?"

What objection does Paul deal with using images of seeds and animals?

The power of the resurrection changes us from mortal to immortal.

How does this help answer questions about what we will be like in heaven?

Our questions usually deal with what we know—like age—which does not fit in the dimension of eternity

What does he mean by "a natural body and a spiritual body?"

Sin made this natural body God created also mortal, subject to death.

Jesus took on our mortal body and died for sin, so our bodies will be

glorified. He does not mean we will just be spirits—we will be perfect body and soul.

What will happen on the last day for us?

Our physical body, though it has returned to the dust, will be raised to life.

How can we know for certain?

Christ's resurrection is proof of his power and that his promise is trustworthy.

How does this strengthen us to live?

Since Christ has power over death, we live victoriously!
