Week One

Prayer:

Dear Father, You are the giver of all good things. Thank you for this opportunity to read and study *LadyLike: Living Biblically*. May the time spent in reading and pondering Your truths in this book and Your Holy Word be a time of renewal and learning. Send your Holy Spirit to guide us in Your wisdom and understanding. In Jesus' Name we pray. Amen.

Reading and Questions:

Reading: Forward, Introduction, and the essay on page 14; see also pages 18, 44, 72, 103, 121, 138, and 152.

Have your Bible close by so that you may refer to the indicated sections of Scripture within each essay.

Questions:

1. Hierarchy is not an ordering based on merit. Consider the game of chess: the king is the principal piece, but there are specialists who are needed for the game to make sense. If everyone were a king, it wouldn't work. Scripture teaches us that there is an order to this life, and that order is good. —Have you ever resented the order established by God?

- —Have you ervied the headship of man?
- —How have you seen the order function well?

Reading: Revisit the essay on page 14; see also pages 18, 21, 27, 38, 44, 56, 61, 66, 72, 103, 121, 138, and 152.

Questions:

2. Ephesians 5:22–23 says, "Wives, submit to your own husbands, as to the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife even as Christ is the head of the church, His body, and is Himself its Savior." The world would tell us that if there is submission it should go both ways. Dr. Thomas Winger writes, "mutual submission is no submission at all" (*Concordia Commentary: Ephesians* (St.

Louis: Concordia Publishing House, 2015, p. 602). Parents don't submit to children, masters don't submit to slaves, generals don't submit to sergeants, and supervisors don't submit to supervisees. Those in authority are called to treat those under them well, but they are not called to submit. These ordered relationships aren't designed to run in reverse.

—How is mutual submission actually impossible?

—What is the godly attitude and action when it comes to wifely submission, either as a personal reality or a Christian concept?

Other prayers to consider as you begin or end your reading and study time:
